The following websites are good sources of information and teaching resources for P4C practitioners:

<u>SAPERE (UK)</u>: SAPERE's P4C resource database provides recommended reading, stimulus material, web links and downloadable resources. You can search in the categories below; by age range, topic/theme and resource type. This database is added to on a monthly basis.

<u>P4C.com</u> (UK): Everything you need to start philosophizing with children: 'How-to' guides, session plans, concept activities, reasoning exercises, p4c curricula for primary schools, key concepts for secondary schools, original stories and dialogues, picture book recommendations and support materials. P4C.com charges a subscription fee so it can pay for its content.

Tom Wartenburg's Teaching Philosophy (USA): Ready to try your hand at having a philosophical discussion with children? To help you out, we've assembled all the materials you'll need to do so, except the books. Most of the modules were created by students in Tom Wartenberg's Philosophy for Children class at Mount Holyoke College. For each story or book, you will find a summary of the plot, a discussion of the main philosophical issues raised by the books, and a series of questions that can be used to initiate philosophical discussion of the story or book with children. Many have been edited by Jayme Johnson and Tom. These are just suggestions for you to think about, so don't feel bound by them. But they'll help you get an idea of how to approach the discussion of the story that you choose.
